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Separation of Personal and Work Life?

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When a manager discovered that one of his workers was committing adultery, the manager told the worker that what the worker did in private was not an issue as long as it did not impact his job performance. By this statement, the manager assumed that the worker's private life could be separated from his work life.

This is a common assumption today. For example, in 1998 President Clinton lied to the American people about an extramarital affair with a female member of his staff. He was impeached by the House of Representatives but ultimately acquitted by the Senate. The message of this action was that the president's lie about his private life did not impair his ability to make good decisions in his work life. Since our government is a representative democracy, the actions of Congress to some degree reflected the views of the American people.

Interestingly, there are some people who don't agree that private life can be bifurcated from work life. One such person is Truett Cathy, the founder of Chick-fil-A. According to a *USA Today* article ("Chick-fil-A Owner Offers Marital Advice on the Side" by Sharon Jayson, *USA Today*, 6/22/06) Mr. Cathy is so convinced that private life and work life are inseparable that he spends millions of dollars a year to support the families and marriages of his workers and his franchisees. This money is invested in such activities as seminars, retreats, and private counseling all designed to strengthen home life.

You may not like the answer, but they support Mr. Cathy's view, not the view of the American people as expressed in the acquittal of President Clinton.

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
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
